Bell Trans, a Nevada Corporation d/b/a Bell Trans, Bell Limousine Sale and Transfer Application Docket 24-10032 December 27, 2024 Special General Session

Application Summary:

On October 28, 2024, Brent Bell, a shareholder of Bell Trans, a Nevada Corporation d/b/a Bell Trans, Bell Limousine (Bell Trans/Seller) and Alexi Darbahani, sole shareholder of Bell Chauffeured Services, Inc. d/b/a KLS Chauffeured Services (Bell Chauffeured Services/Buyer)/(Applicants) filed a joint application for Bell Trans to sell and transfer and for Bell Chauffeured Services to purchase and acquire the charter limousine, airport transfer, special services, scenic tour, and charter bus authority granted to Bell Trans under CPCN 1023.2 (Attachment A).

On December 10, 2024, a protest was filed by Brian Hardy Esq. on behalf of Empire International, LTD. (Attachment B)

On December 12, 2024, an amendment to the application was filed to add Bell Trans and Bell Limousine as fictitious firm names.

Staff Discussion:

Staff supports this application in all aspects except for the fact that the criminal background report has not been received. Assuming no issues in that regard, staff supports the application, and therefore requests the application hearing be dispensed per NRS 706.6411. The following procedures were performed by Staff with acceptable results:

- 1) No Petitions for Leave to Intervene were filed.
- 2) Background investigation was performed with no areas of concern. (Attachment C)
- 3) Pro Forma Balance Sheet includes 328 vehicles; reports 34% equity ratio; reports a 4.54 current ratio; has enough cash to cover 90 days' worth of fixed expenses; and meets all financial requirements. No cash infusion is required because the current bank balance exceeds the amount of cash needed. (Attachment D)
- 4) Pro Forma Income Statement projects \$28,876,685 in revenues and net income \$3,512,064 in the first 12 months of operating. The expenses are reasonable and show that the applicant will be compensable. (Attachment E)
- 5) Tariff The Applicant is not proposing any rate changes from those currently used by Bell Trans. (Attachment F)

The Nevada Transportation Authority ("Authority") finds that the above-named carrier has complied with this Authority's Compliance Order dated October 27, 2011, the findings of fact and conclusions of law which are hereby incorporated by this reference, and therefore is entitled to receive authority from this Authority to engage in transportation in intrastate commerce as a motor carrier.

IT IS ORDERED that certificate of public convenience and necessity identified as CPCN 1023, Sub 1 is hereby cancelled and BELL TRANS, A Nevada Corporation d/b/a Bell Trans, Bell Limousine is hereby granted this certificate of public convenience and necessity, identified as CPCN 1023, Sub 2 as evidence of the authority of the holder to engage in transportation in intrastate commerce as a common carrier by motor vehicle subject to applicable statutes, rules and regulations of the Authority, and such terms, conditions and limitations as are now or may hereafter be attached to the exercise of the privileges herein granted.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED and made a condition of this certificate that the holder shall render reasonably continuous and adequate service to the public in pursuance of the authority herein granted, and that failure to do so shall constitute sufficient grounds for suspension, modification or revocation of this certificate.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that nothing contained herein shall be construed to be either a franchise or irrevocable and that failure to comply with rules, regulations and orders of the Authority and applicable statutory provisions shall constitute sufficient grounds for suspension or revocation of this certificate.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that this authority shall not be sold or transferred without the Authority's prior approval.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the transportation service to be performed by said carrier shall be as specified below:

- Passengers and their baggage in scheduled and non-scheduled operations between all sirports located in Clark County, Nevada on the one hand, and, on the other, all points and places in Clark County, Nevada, where said traffic may originate or terminate.
- Passengers and their luggage in uniformed chauffeured limousine service only, which have a capacity of less than nine (9) persons, including the driver, between points and places in Clark County, Nevada, and between points and places in Clark County, Nevada, on the one hand, and, on the other, points and places in Nevada.

The following portion of this certificate related to the provision of charter service was granted pursuant to the Commissioner's Order in Docket No. 89-172. BELL TRANS shall have the authority to engage in charter service, defined under NAC 706.034(1). In addition to this definition of charter service, BELL TRANS shall be allowed the ability to charter equipment to persons who may utilize it for sightseeing and to provide self-guided tours.

3. Transportation of passengers and their baggage in the same motor vehicle, on call, over irregular routes, in charter and special services between points and places in Clark County, Nevada, and between points and places in Clark County, Nevada, on the one hand, and, on the other, points and places in Nevada, in buses of 20 passengers or fewer capacity, excluding driver.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that the Authority retains jurisdiction for the purpose of correcting any errors which may have occurred in the drafting or Issuance of this Order and Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity.

COMES NOW, Empire International Ltd. ("Empire"), by and through its counsel, the law firm of Marquis Aurbach Chtd., and hereby respectfully files its written Protest to the Application filed with the Nevada Transportation Authority (NTA) requesting authority for Bell Trans, a Nevada Corporation dba Bell Trans, Bell Limousine (hereafter, "Bell") to temporarily transfer and subsequently finalize the sale and transfer of the operating rights held pursuant to Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity (CPCN) No. 1023 to Bell Chauffeured Services Inc. dba KLS Chauffeured (hereafter, "KLS"). Empire now files this Protest pursuant to Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) 706.397.

INTRODUCTION I.

On or about October 28, 2024, the NTA received the Application, dated October 24, 2024, filed by Bell and KLS pursuant to NAC 706A. The Application seeks the NTA's authority to temporarily transfer and subsequently finalize the sale and transfer the operating rights maintained pursuant to CPCN 1023.2 Specifically, KLS "requests authority to operate as a common motor carrier of passengers by providing charter limousine, airport transfer, special services, scenic tour and charter bus services." KLS intends to "service points and places in Clark County Nevada consistent with the geographic authority set forth in CPCN 1023."4

Now, in response to the Application, Empire hereby files this written Protest and requests that the NTA deny the Application or, alternatively, at a minimum, deny KLS temporary authority of CPCN 1023 until the total and complete investigation is concluded.

II. THE FACTS

KLS currently operates a fleet of fewer than fifty (50) vehicles in Los Angeles, California, and KLS has no operational experience managing fleets in any other location. Understandably, if the Application is granted, KLS' expansion to over three hundred (300) vehicles in Las Vegas,

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Nevada without any prior experience at this scale raises concerns about their operational expertise, capacity and longevity in Las Vegas.

Previously, in an effort to enter the New York City market, KLS applied for a base license with the Taxi and Limousine Commission (TLC), which requires operators to maintain a minimum of ten (10) vehicles. However, rather than acquiring these vehicles, KLS arranged for other companies with existing base licenses in New York to join their base license. While this practice may technically be permissible, this approach exhibits KLS' financial limitations and inexperience in other markets. If KLS could not support ten (10) vehicles in the New York market, then their ability to financially sustain a fleet of over three hundred (300) vehicles in Las Vegas is highly questionable.

On or about October 28, 2024, the NTA received the Application from Bell and KLS, dated October 24, 2024. ⁵ The Application requests authority to temporarily transfer and finalize the sale and transfer of operating rights under CPCN 1023, in accordance with NAC 706A. 6 However, KLS' limited operational experience in Los Angeles, combined with the critical concerns for its financial stability set forth herein, creates significant doubt about KLS' capacity to successfully operate CPCN 1023, as well as to effectively handle the complexities and demands of a much larger operation in a unique and technical market, such as Las Vegas.

As stated in the NTA's Notice of Application, interested persons may submit protests for filing with the NTA.⁷ Now, Empire files its Protest in compliance with NAC 706.397.

III. LEGAL AUTHORITY

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NAC 706.397 – REQUIREMENTS FOR A PROTEST TO AN APPLICATION

NAC 706.397 sets forth the statutory requirements for a protest to an NTA application. NAC 706.397 states, in pertinent part, that "[a] written protest must legibly set forth a clear statement of the matter to which an objection is made."8

B. NAC 706.1375 – REQUIREMENTS FOR AN APPLICATION

NAC 706.1375 outlines the requirements for an application relating to licenses, certificates, and permits for motor carriers. In compliance with the NTA's regulations, NAC 706.1375 mandates comprehensive documentation and exhibits which must be attached to the application, including service descriptions, geographical areas, equipment details, financial statements, and corporate information. ¹⁰ Specifically, NAC 706.1375(2) sets forth that:

- 2. An application described in subsection 1 must contain the following data, either in the application or as exhibits attached thereto:
- (a) The type of service, if any, presently being performed by the applicant, a general description of the service and a reference to the authority pursuant to which the service is being performed.
- (b) The type of service proposed, a general description of the service and a reference to the authority pursuant to which the service is to be performed.
- (c) The specific authority requested and the statutory provision pursuant to which the certificate is requested.
- (d) If the applicant proposes to be a carrier of household goods, a description of the types of household goods proposed to be transported.
- (e) The geographical area proposed to be served pursuant to the certificate, including, without limitation, the terminal and other points to be served, the number and location of points where equipment will be located, and a concise, narrative description of the proposed route.
- (f) A map or sketch of the route and points to be served, drawn to a suitable scale which is indicated on the map or sketch. The map or sketch must show present and proposed operations by distinctive coloring or marking.
- (g) If the applicant proposes to be a contract carrier or is an existing contract carrier proposing to add subsequent contracts, a copy of each proposed contract.
- (h) A statement of the rates or fares proposed to be charged and the rules governing service in the form of a tariff prepared pursuant to NAC 706.138 to 706.139, inclusive.

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- (i) The type and number of units of equipment to be used in the proposed service and a statement as to which units of equipment are owned by the applicant that includes, without limitation, photographs of the equipment to be used and a copy of the registration and title of each vehicle currently owned by the applicant which will be used under its operating authority. If the applicant proposes to operate a taxicab service, the application must include the proposed color scheme of the vehicles that will be used to provide the taxicab service.
- (i) A statement indicating the frequency of the proposed service. If oncall service is proposed, the application must set forth the conditions under which the service would be performed.
- (k) A statement of the qualifications and experience of the personnel who will manage and operate the proposed service and the proposed operating procedures related to service, safety, maintenance, training of drivers, billing, relations with customers and the keeping of records.
- (1) A statement describing the facilities which will be used to provide the proposed service, such as terminals, shops, warehouses or offices.
- (m) Facts showing that the proposed operation is or will be beneficial to the traveling public.
- (n) If the applicant is a corporation or limited-liability company, a copy of its articles of incorporation or articles of organization, certified by the Secretary of State, and all effective amendments thereto. If the corporation or limited-liability company was incorporated or established in another state, the application must include:
- (1) A copy of the certificate issued by the Office of the Secretary of State authorizing the corporation or limited-liability company to transact its business in the State of Nevada; or
 - (2) Its equivalent, as provided in NRS 80.120.
- (o) If the applicant is a partnership, a copy of the partnership agreement and any amendments made thereto.
- (p) If the applicant is not a natural person, a list of all owners, including associated stock certificates, membership certificates or associated documents, along with the percentage of ownership of each partner, member or owner. If the applicant is a publicly traded corporation, the application may include a copy of Form 10-K, or its equivalent, filed by the corporation with the Securities and Exchange Commission that shows the controlling ownership, officers and directors in lieu of the list of all owners, including associated stock certificates, membership certificates or associated documents.
- (q) Evidence that the applicant is financially able to operate the proposed business, including, without limitation:
- (1) A statement of income for the 12-month period immediately preceding the application.
- (2) A pro forma statement of income for the first 12-month period, presented in a monthly basis format, of the proposed operation using the proposed rates. The Authority may require, as a condition to the granting of the application, that the applicant is prohibited from placing into service more vehicles than the vehicles projected in the pro forma statement for any period that the Authority deems necessary to ensure that the granting of the application will not unreasonably and adversely affect other carriers operating in the territory.
- (3) A balance sheet which was prepared not more than 6 months before the date of the application which:

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- (I) For a sole proprietorship or partnership, must reflect the personal and business operations of the sole proprietor or each general partner.
- (II) For a corporation, limited-liability company or partnership, must reflect the entire business operations.
- (4) A list of the names and addresses of all transportation entities owned by or under the control of the applicant.

All financial statements must be prepared pursuant to generally accepted accounting principles, except that the personal financial statement of a sole proprietor or general partner may be prepared on the basis of estimated values.

- (r) If the applicant is operating under a fictitious name, a copy of the certificate filed pursuant to chapter 602 of NRS, if applicable.
- (s) Evidence that the applicant can secure the insurance required by NAC 706.191.
- (t) If the applicant is proposing to transport and store household goods and effects, proof that the applicant has the ability to store such goods and effects in a warehouse operated in accordance with the requirements of chapter 712 of NRS. As used in this paragraph, "warehouse" includes, without limitation, any structure used for the reception and storage of household goods and effects.
- (u) Additional information as is necessary for a full understanding of the application.

Additionally, under NAC 706.1375(3):

3. If any item required pursuant to this section or by statute is omitted or otherwise deficient after acceptance of the application or filing, the Authority will notify the applicant of the omission or deficiency, in writing, at the address of the applicant listed on the application or filing. If the applicant does not cure the omission or deficiency within 15 working days after the issuance of that notification, the Deputy Commissioner shall, at the next regular meeting of the Authority, move that the application or filing be dismissed.

C. NAC 706.359 – INTERIM AUTHORITY

NAC 706.359 provides the requirements and procedures for seeking temporary transfer of operating rights.¹¹ Pursuant to NAC 706.359:

- 1. A temporary transfer of operating rights may be approved if the Authority finds it is in the public interest.
- 2. Applicants who seek approval of a temporary transfer of operating rights for a limited period, whether by lease, operating contract or otherwise, must state in their application the circumstances which makes the transfer necessary, the specified period for which the transfer is sought, the consideration for the transfer, the time and method of payment and that the applicants have agreed in writing that all operating rights involved in the transaction revert to the transferor at the expiration of the term, or upon a discontinuance of operations by the transferee at any time before the expiration of the term. In case of reversion, the transferor shall give immediate notice to the Authority. It must be further stipulated by the

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applicants that the transferee will be responsible for furnishing all reports required by the Authority.

3. Unless unusual circumstances are involved, an application for the transfer of operating rights for a limited time will not be approved for a period of less than 30 days, nor longer than 2 years, during which time the parties will be expected to consider and determine whether they want to enter into a permanent transaction of sale and purchase of the rights. Nothing in this section may be construed as approving a sale and purchase of operating rights in advance of an application.

IV. LEGAL ARGUMENT

THE APPLICATION MUST BE DENIED BECAUSE KLS IS NOT A. AUTHORIZED TO ACQUIRE AND OPERATE CPCN 1023 AND DOES NOT HAVE THE EXPERIENCE NECESSARY TO OPERATE AN UNLIMITED LICENSE.

The NTA should deny the Application because KLS is not authorized to acquire and operate CPCN 1023. Additionally, KLS lacks a demonstrably proven track record of experience and stability, which is necessary to manage a fleet of over three hundred (300) vehicles as proposed in the Application. KLS currently operates a fleet of fewer than fifty (50) vehicles in Los Angeles, and KLS has no operational experience managing fleets in any other location. KLS' limited operational and technical experience raises serious concerns about its ability to manage a significantly larger fleet in Las Vegas. This substantial increase in fleet size and the change in location from Los Angeles to Las Vegas represent a significant operational challenge that KLS is demonstrably unprepared to handle, as set forth herein and in its Application.¹²

1. The Application Does Not Meet the NTA's Requirements Set Forth In NAC 706.1375.

The Application should be denied because KLS does not meet the NTA's requirements to acquire and operate CPCN 1023 as set forth in NAC 706.1375. NAC 706.152(2) sets forth the procedure that the NTA "will make an investigation before the issuance of a certificate or permit."13 Additionally, the NTA possesses the authority to dismiss "[a]n application that does not comply with NAC 706.1375[.]"14

NAC 706.1375(2)(m) requires the Application to contain facts a. showing that KLS' proposed operation is or will benefit the traveling public.

Pursuant to NAC 76.1375(2), an application described in NAC 706.1375(1) is required to contain "facts showing that the proposed operation is or will be beneficial to the traveling public[.]"15 While KLS attempts to comply with this statutory requirement and includes Exhibit M to the Application, which is intended to show facts "that the proposed operation is or will be beneficial to the traveling public[,]" KLS fails to properly meet this requirement. 16 Exhibit M to the Application states that KLS:

Intends to make the following enhancements to the [Bell's] fleet, operations, service standards, and driver workforce:

- 1. Enhance employee opportunities for growth within the transportation service industry.
- 2. Enhance best practices standards in the commercial transportation industry.
- 3. Deploy enhanced driver safety training and certification programs to ensure and reward safe driving and customer satisfaction.
- 4. Introduction of sustainable solutions to improve performance and passenger experience.
- 5. Develop relationships with State stakeholders in order to secure government contracts. 17
- 6. Work with employees, employee representatives, insurers, and technology providers to improve safe driving.

However, KLS wholly fails to provide any specific or tangible ways it will benefit the traveling public and lacks supporting evidence and details as to how KLS will achieve these generic goals. Applications simply cannot be granted based upon grandiose concepts and vague self-serving statements. Rather, an applicant must articulate "[f]acts showing that the proposed operation is or will be beneficial to the traveling public." Black's Law Dictionary defines a fact as "[s]omething that actually exists . . . an actual or alleged event or circumstance, as distinguished from its legal effect, consequence, or interpretation." Clearly, the list above contains nothing but unsupported conclusions instead of identifying specific actions that will be undertaken to

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accomplish the stated goals - e.g. what is KLS specifically going to do that would enhance employee opportunities for growth with the entire transportation industry (while one questions how this would assist the traveling public it would be great to hear KLS' specific proposal for how its going to positively impact the entire industry for the benefit of all employees).

NAC 706.1375(2)(q) requires evidence that KLS is financially b. able to operate the proposed business.

Pursuant to NAC 76.1375(2), an application described in NAC 706.1375(1) must contain "evidence that the applicant is financially able to operate the proposed business[.]"20 However, serious concerns exist regarding KLS' financial stability.

These concerns pose significant risks not only to Bell's employees, but also to the public. A financially unstable fleet operator may be unable to maintain its vehicles properly, which increases the risk of accidents and injuries such that KLS could pose a threat to the safety of the traveling public. Furthermore, financial instability can lead to disruptions in service, impacting Bell's operations and potentially leaving the Las Vegas public without essential transportation services that the public rely upon.

Reports of KLS' delayed payments to its affiliates and unfair business and payment practices, such as failing to compensate for garage time, further demonstrates KLS' apparent financial instability and its inability to successfully operate a Las Vegas fleet. These reports suggest a pattern of financial mismanagement that raises serious questions about KLS' ability to meet its financial obligations and operate a large fleet responsibly without cutting corners.

Additionally, KLS' business practices raise additional concerns about its financial stability. For example, KLS' approach to obtaining a base license in New York City, New York involved utilizing vehicles belonging to other companies. This practice raises questions about KLS' ability to independently acquire and maintain its own fleet, suggesting a lack of financial resources, and

The consequences of KLS' failure of successfully operating CPCN 1023 in Las Vegas are substantial. If KLS is unable to successfully manage the proposed Las Vegas fleet, then it will likely result in a critical shortage of transportation vehicles in Las Vegas, potentially disrupting the industry's operations, and negatively impacting its employees and the traveling public. Moreover, KLS' failure in Las Vegas could lead to the displacement of Bell's employees who rely on the Las Vegas fleet for their livelihoods.

B. THE NTA CANNOT GRANT KLS TEMPORARY TRANSFER OF CPCN 1023'S OPERATING RIGHTS BECAUSE KLS DOES NOT MEET THE REQUIREMENTS SET FORTH IN NAC 706.359.

In continuity with NAC 706.359, the temporary transfer of operating rights should be reserved only for those that meet the requirements, qualifications, and experience that interim authority requires.

The NTA's investigation is essential to ensuring the proper vetting procedure occurs prior to KLS possessing authority to acquire and operate CPCN 1023. NAC 706.152(2) details that the NTA "will make an investigation before the issuance of a certificate or permit." However, interim authority, if granted pursuant to NAC 706.359, allows an applicant to begin temporarily operating as requested prior to the NTA's completion of its investigation. The NTA may approve a temporary transfer of operating rights "if the [NTA] finds it is in the public interest." However, the NTA should not allow KLS to acquire interim authority of CPCN 1023 prior to the conclusion of the NTA's total and complete investigation.

Thus, at a minimum, the NTA should not grant KLS temporary authority because it does not meet the requirements set forth in NAC 706.359. As demonstrated in the Application and set forth herein, there is no evidence that the proposed transfer will in any way benefit the traveling

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public or be in the traveling public's interest. For example, KLS does not indicate that the temporary transfer will aid in the retention of employees, nor is there any evidence that the temporary transfer will ensure the continuing operations necessary to serve the traveling public in Las Vegas. Rather, continuing with and experienced operator such as Bell remains the only sensible option while the Authority investigates and fully vets KLS.

Equally compelling is the fact that KLS is new to the Nevada market and has no experience or familiarity with Nevada's transportation laws and the associated obligations of a certificated carrier. Specifically, 1) the requirement that, after receiving a certificate or permit, that every fully regulated carrier shall maintain a twenty percent (20%) equity interest in the company; 2) the obligation to adhere to a tariff; and 3) the necessity of providing transportation services on a reasonably continuance basis.²³

Collectively, these factors indicate a complete failure of KLS to demonstrate that the traveling public will benefit from the requested transfer of operating rights of CPCN 1023. Without question, if the NTA does not deny the Application, then KLS' operation of CPCN 1023 will negatively impact the traveling public, existing carriers, their drivers, and their employees. Thus, clearly the Application fails to demonstrate how allowing KLS to temporarily operate CPCN 1023 is in the traveling public's interest. Accordingly, the NTA should deny KLS' ability to temporarily operate CPCN 1023 under NAC 706.359.

V. CONCLUSION

For the reasons set forth herein, Empire files its Protest and respectfully requests that the NTA deny the Application for KLS to acquire and operate CPCN 1023 due to its failure to demonstrate that approval of will be in the traveling public's interest, in addition to the grave concerns and serious issues regarding KLS' qualifications, limited operational experience, and financial stability. However, should the NTA somehow determine that a continued investigation

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into the permanent transfer of CPCN 1023 to KLS is in the public's interest, Empire respectfully requests that, at a minimum, the NTA deny KLS temporary transfer of CPCN 1023, and thus KLS must wait to possess authority of CPCN 1023 until the NTA's total and complete investigation concludes.

FUEL SURCHARGE TABLE AND RULES

The following Fuel Surcharge Rules will apply to carriers who are authorized to provide charter service by limousine and who are authorized to charge and collect a fuel surcharge:

- The price of regular and diesel fuel is an amount equal to the retail price per gallon of regular and diesel fuel effective for the 25th calendar day of the immediately preceding month determined according to the United States Department of Energy (DOE), Energy Information Administration (EIA) survey on Weekly Retail Gasoline and Diesel Prices, Regular Grade West coast (PADD 5) and Weekly Retail Gasoline and Diesel Prices, Diesel, All Types West Coast (PADD 5). The prices may be obtained by calling the DOE, EIA at (800) 586-8800 or via the DOE, EIA web site at www.eia.doe.gov, via the "Petroleum" link.
- 2. If the 25th day of the calendar month is a Federal holiday, the price will be determined based on the stated DOE price available on the next subsequent business day.
- 3. The DOE fuel price obtained will then be indexed based on the matrix set forth below to determine the fuel surcharge. The fuel surcharge will apply for all charter limousine transportation beginning on the 1st day of the following month and will remain in effect through the last day of that calendar month.
- 4. The fuel surcharge will be added on an hourly basis utilizing the matrix set forth below. The resulting charge is in addition to all other applicable transportation charges.

When the DOE Fuel Price Per Gallon reported on the 25th of the month is:	The Fuel Surcharge that becomes effective on the 1st day of the following month is:

NOTE 1: The fuel surcharge, if applicable for a given month, must be passed along to all customers.

NOTE 2: The fuel surcharge must be shown separately from the charter revenue on carrier transportation documents for the purpose of identifying the amount as special fuel-related revenue.

3% TAX Pursuant to section 51 of AB175

The following rules apply to carriers who provide passenger transportation, excluding airport transport service:

Pursuant to Nevada Legislative Senate Bill No.376 Sec. 36. Section 51 of Assembly Bill No.175 of this section is hereby amended to read as follows:

- Sec. 51. 1. Except or otherwise provided in subsection 2 and in addition to any other fee or assessment imposed pursuant to this chapter, an excise tax is hereby imposed on the connection, whether by dispatch or other means, made by a common motor carrier of a passenger to a person or operator willing to transport the passenger at the rate of 3% of the total fare charged for the transportation, which must include, without limitation, all fees, surcharges, technology fees, convenience charges for the use of a credit or debit card and any other amount that is part of the fare. The Department of Taxation shall charge and collect from each common motor carrier of passengers the excise tax imposed by this subsection.
 - 2. The provisions of subsection 1 do not apply to an airport transfer service.
 - 3. (Intentionally omitted).
- 4. As used in this section, "airport transfer service" means the transportation of passengers and their baggage in the same vehicle, except by taxicab, for a per capita charge between airports or between an airport and points and places in this State. The term does not include charter services by bus, charter services by limousine, scenic tours or special services.
- NOTE 1: The passenger transportation recovery charge must be passed along to all customers.
- NOTE 2: The 3 % passenger transportation recovery charge must be shown separately from the total fare as defined above.
